





It gives me immense pleasure in writing my message as President to all the readers of club souvenir magazine. The Himalayan Gurkhas which was Chartered in September 2003 has matured as fully fledged Rotary club in its own right over the past 13 years. With 30 members of which two are ladies and several most respected honorary members from across the Globe, The Himalayan Gurkhas have managed to live up to its own club Motto "YES WE HELP"

The main thrust of club has been and will continue to be so "to help needy people in the remote hills" The help would be in various forms and will include, Education and Literacy, Health and Hygiene, Vocational education, Water and sanitation and Economic regeneration and Community Development. With help from clubs in Rotary International District 1040 and Rotary clubs across United Kingdom, The Himalayan Gurkhas has seen success in "Changing Young Lives" in remote hills.

Last year has been the most tumultuous year for us all. The devastating Nepal earthquake 2015 has left many scars in the life of many of thousands of Nepalese. The Himalayan Gurkhas with many international connections rose to the occasion and was in the front line of disaster relief work immediately after the first earthquake. One of the major donors, Rotary International District 1040 and many friendly Rotary clubs and non Rotarian friends across the Globe came to rescue of those in desperate need of help by sending relief funds through The Himalayan Gurkhas. Initially, the work was in form of "First aid" by way of distribution of Food items, Blankets, Shelter and CGI sheets. The club is now concentrating on Rehabilitation and rebuilding of earthquake damaged schools and drinking water sources. To date, more than 21 earthquake related projects, from Dubekul in Khotang District in the East to Rani Pani, Bihadi in Parbat District in the West (covering more than 400kms) have been either completed and handed over to the community or in the final stages of completion. This for a small club like The Himalayan Gurkhas is a significant achievement.

The coming months and years are going to be equally challenging as was the past. Rotary club of The Himalayan Gurkhas will thrive to face challenges with gusto, follow Rotary International motto "Service above Self" the four way test, participate in Rotary International Nepal District 3292 guidelines and activities.

Finally, I would like to thank Rotary International District 1040, many Rotary clubs and many individuals across the Globe for their kind donation which has helped many earthquake victims in the remote hills. My message will not be complete without paying respect and expressing my sincere "Thank you" to our club honorary members and the members of the club who have given their best to the club as well as to the community during the time of need. Your contribution is much appreciated.

Editorial

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This souvenir Magazine tries to illustrate activities carried out by Rotary Club of The Himalayan Gurkhas over the past few years as well as those of recent events. In its short existence, Club has been active with more than 60 projects of various nature under its belt. Majority of the projects have been targeted to the remote hills where most of the population live below national poverty line and the level of literacy is also very low. The slogan coined by Rotarian friends from International Rotary District 1040 "CHANGING YOUNG LIVES" in remote hills has been most appropriate and successful in every sense. IT literacy, Health and Hygiene, safe drinking water and economic regeneration by way of Micro Loan scheme has played an important part in CHANGING YOUNG LIVES in the remote hills.

The routine club project activities suddenly came to stand still when central Nepal and its surrounding Districts was rocked by devastating EARTHQUAKE in late April, followed by one in May 2015. Club members realized the magnitude of the Earthquake and began gathering information from various sources across the earthquake hit districts. Immediate action followed. Emails to many Rotarian and Non Rotarian friends in the United Kingdom, Hong Kong, North America and in the South East Asian countries were sent asking for help. The response was unbelievably swift from all those we wrote to.

Donations started pouring in from all directions. Between May last year and to date The Himalayan Gurkhas managed to organize post earthquake relief distribution to more than 20 earthquake affected locations, extending from Dubekul in Khotang District in East Nepal to Ranipani in Parbat District West Nepal, covering more than 400kms. The immediate relief work has undoubtedly minimized the suffering of the victims of Earthquake.

Club members played an important part in implementing relief and rehabilitation work through hard work, dedication and professionalism under extremely difficult conditions. The outcomes are visible for all to see and are testament to drive and desire of club members to help those in need.

Many helped the victims of Earthquake by sending their donations through The Himalayan Gurkhas. Of the many donors, Rotary International District 1040, Yorkshire deserve special mention for their outstanding contribution. For the rest of the donors Worldwide, I can only say THANK YOU, which I do with honour and Gratitude.



How it all began

Soon after I retired from the Gurkha Reserve Unit I was approached by Captain Asbahadur Gurung with the idea of forming a Rotary Club which would consist of mostly retired officers and men from the Brigade of Gurkhas. I pondered over the idea for some time and eventually thought this to be a good idea as we would be a disciplined and dedicated force and encouraged Captain Asbahadur to move ahead with the idea.

I had the privilege of serving together with this able and thoroughly reliable officer during my time in the Army and trusted him in every way. Additionally after his retirement which was several years before me, he joined the rotary club of Mount Everest and became very much aware of what a rotary club can do for the needy and under privileged people. Our roots, despite where we are living now, lie in the hills and those whom we met and had preliminary discussions with were all very keen to take the services of the club to the villages where help was most needed. This then was the driving force behind the formation of Thi Rotary Club of The Himalayan Gurkhas.

The very first gathering took place in Captain Asbahadur's house in Chun Devi on 07 Dec 2002 where the potential Rotarians had gathered. After Captain Asbahadur's talk aboi rotary the gathering was suitably impressed and we decided to go ahead with the idea (forming a rotary club.

The Rotary Club of the Himatayan Gurkhas was registered with District 3290 with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu North as our sponsoring club. Mr. Mingma Sherpa was assigned to us as the Governor's Special Representative. He was to be our guide and mentor for the next two years or until we were chartered. He would, in the days to come, lead us by the hand through the alleyways and the broad streets of The Rotary World.

During the early days we held our meetings at Hotel Karnali near Narayan Gopal Chowk under the guidance of The GSR. It was difficult to make the meetings interesting not really knowing the facts and figures of The Rotary World. The attendance was not so enthusiastic to begin with but after a few minor projects under our bells members saw for themselves what could be done to help the needy and our Rotarians began to take interest.

Kamali Hotel did not prove to be a very suitable venue for our weekly meetings and we moved to Hotel Shangri-ta in Lazimpat. We got a good deal as the owner was himself Rotarian and we still continue with our meetings here.

The Club was granted the Charter from 10^a September 2003 but the ceremony was held on 23^a January 2004 at Hotel Radisson. The Governor was sadly trapped in Simla due to the almost daily strikes at the time and was officiated by Themas Manekshaw. We we very happy that he stood in for the Governor as he is a cousin brother of Field Marshal Manekshaw whom I all know and admire. We were honoured to have His Excellency I Keith Bloomfield, The British Ambassador, and his lady for the occasion. The retired Buros from the Brigade of Gurkhas appreciated this very much.

Finally our dreams of helping the needy in our villages still remain strong and this about to be partially fulfilled by the IPP Major Bimbahadur Gurung whose efforts to get matching grant to the tune of some 3 million rupees for a village school is about to bear fruit am confident that there will be many more projects forthcoming for the needy people of villages where our roots are still very strong.











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"CHANGING YOUNG LIVES IN NEPAL" An IT, Literacy and Economic Regeneration Project

Introduction:

It was way back in 2009 that I started to look for an International project which could promote Harrogate Brigantes in their pursuit of the Rotary Service ethic. Eventually I came to meet up with Major Yam Gurung, RC Himalayan Gurkhas, Kathmandu who requested help in installing computers in 2 Secondary schools, Rithepani and Panchamul. Ok we thought, this sounds fairly straight forward..... How wrong we were!! What we have learnt:

After much internal discussion and over a period of 5 years, we realised that computers and teaching IT were the means to a far more compelling vision. This was about improving education, thereby obtaining better exam results and giving students better job prospects. We also became involved in addressing the poverty challenge in remote areas, such as the Panchamul Valley where many families struggle to make a living.

What we have achieved?

- 10 schools now fitted with IT suites, 7 in the Panchamul Valley, 3 elsewhere, all supported by committed Rotarians from the Himalayan Gurkhas
- Total cost has been ~£75k or ~\$120k, 70% funded by the Rotary Foundation
- Substantial effort has been involved in designing the IT suite, its infrastructure and commissioning the same, mainly carried out by UK Rotarians. Andy Morrison, our IT 'guru' has led this activity
- In total, 17 UK Rotarians from District 1040, Yorkshire, have visited Nepal in support of this project, some as many as 5 times

- Induction training for Teachers by the UK teamshas taken place for most of these schools
- A great leap forward took place in 2012, when we linked the Panchamul Valley to the internet and to the outside world. This was a further major technological step into the future.
- We have carried out regular IT and Literacy/Educational audits since 2009, the latter led by Gill Poole, our Education expert (refer her separate report). After some early teething issues, we now see major progress at all the schools.
- We introduced the Rotary Microloan scheme in 2014 which now is running in parallel with the above, enabling parents to feel more financially secure in their home valley and encourage their children to pursue their education locally.
- As at April 2015, a total of >£3k has been loaned out and the first tranche of recipients have already repaid their loans. Over 100 local families have now benefitted.
- The trial of pilot software at a Primary school for teaching English (a prototype language lab) has been successful.
- There is now trained local IT support (trouble shooting and fault rectification) available on call out, funded by ourselves, during the transition to the schools financial self-sustainability.

The Future of the Project:

We are putting together a project plan to 1) Upgrade the Internet Infrastructure in the Valley, 2) Establish an IME in Panchamul Valley and 3) Install language Labs at the remaining 6 Valley Schools for the benefit of primary age children. The likely total cost is >£20k or >\$30k.

We will also provide some financial support to the schools in the Valley over the next 2/3 yearswhilst they find the means to become financially able to cover themselves the maintenance and running cost of their IT suites.

Summary:

This is by far the most satisfying project that we Rotarians have been involved in. We now can see that for one remote location in the Himalayan foothills, we are 'CHANGING YOUNG LIVES IN NEPAL'!!

Note: Rotarian Barry Pollard has been leading Nepal IT, Literacy and Changing Young Lives through economic regeneration projects since February 2011. He has made 6 trips to Nepal to date.








the challenges in their future career. Periodical audit is part of the Rotarians commitment to make this project a success.

Be a gift to the world

IT Educations in the remote hills

Visiting Rtn from Rotary International District 1040 England

Narendra Chapagain will no longer have to make a five-hour journey from Panchamul to Pokhara to fulfil his desire of learning computer. He is thrilled to be getting an opportunity to learn computer as an optional subject in the school he goes to. Chapagain studies in grade eight in Tri Shahid Higher Secondary School. His parents are equally happy about the new facility since they don't have to send him to the city and spend a lot on computer education.

Panchamul village development committee is excited about the computer classes that are going to run in the local school. It is the first time that the village is going to have computer and internet facilities thanks to the effort put in by the Rotary Club of Himalayan Gorkhas. The club was registered in 2003 and had to struggle for it's existence for the first few years. For long, the club could not go beyond programmes determined by Rotary International. But as an initiative to do something new, the club brought out an Information Technology Program in 2010. Club's president Lilbahadur Gurung says that they introduced the program to ensure that students in the village could also benefit from computer education and technology. "The world has envisaged a

new age whereas our rural youths do not even have access to the internet. That's why we started this program," he said.

"Youths are leaving the village and going to cities or foreign countries for better education. We wanted to make sure that they could at least get high-school level education in their own village," he added. The course was started two years ago as an optional subject from grade six and is being moved up with each grade till the 10th. If the Ministry of Education grants permission, the school will also include this as a subject for the School Leaving Certificate examinations, principal of Trishahid school, Prem Prashad Upadhyaya says. The club is spending \$42,000 for this initiative named "Panchmul Valley Internet Access Program". There are also Ten other schools that have benefitted from this program. Shri Janahit High School of Panchamul, Shri Darau High School of Darau and Shahid Smarak College in Sharadanagar, Chitawan, Shree Bir Lower secondary school in Rithepani, Kaski, Shree Ratna Shova Higher secondary school at Majhathana, Kaski, Shree Jana HSS Rapakot, Shree Sarbodaya HSS, Aruchaur, Shree Ghante HSS, Aruchaur, Shree Gaun Farka LSS in Panchamul - 4 and Shree Tri Shahid HSS Panchamul, have also been provided with







computers and connected to internet. Teachers have been trained in Pokhara as well as in situ to conduct the computer classes.

The Rotary Club of Himalayan Gurkhas has received monetary assistance from the Rotary Club of Harrogate Brigantes in the United Kingdom for this project. An e-library has been brought into operation by RC Himalavan Gurkhas at Tri shahid school."The school didn't have anything other than except few books in its old library. Now it's easy to access information. The club's contribution to improving quality of education in the village is exemplary," Principal Upadhyaya says. The club also has computer education in other schools of Kaski, Chitwan and Syangja. The club has put up repeator towers in Satau of Syangja and in Darau Danda and server in Nuwakot Danda of Pokhara for providing internet connection. Rs 600,000 has been spent just for this. Other schools with computers will also be able to take internet facility from this tower, says President Gurung. Interested parties can pay a minimum monthly fee to benefit from this facility, he said. Technology comes to the village: The RC Himalayan Gurkhas will be providing internet facility to other service providers in Panchamul through the repeater tower. The 25 bedded cooperative hospital that is being built in

Panchamul will be taking internet service from the club to run a telemedicine program. The tourism village of Sirubari is also going to benefit from the internet service. President Gurung says that tourists in Sirubari won't have to shorten their stay just because of the lack of internet now. Internet for remittance: More than 6000 youths from Panchamul have migrated abroad for work. Remittance sent by relatives working abroad is the main source of livelihood for most families in Panchamul. Because there was no internet, villagers had difficulty receiving money sent by relatives from abroad. The club is now going to run a money transfer service to solve this problem. The club is also going to run a Televet system for treating livestock. The club has also been involved in running drinking water, education and health projects in Lamjung, Dhading, Okhaldhunga, Kaski, Chitwan and several other districts. The Club spends Rs 3 to 4 million every year for these projects. Most of this fund is generated either internally or by generous contributions made from international rotary clubs. More than 70% of the members in the club are ex British Gurkhas and they come from Khotang in the east to Parbat in the west. There are 31 members in the club who are involved in tourism, import-export, education, health, security and technical sectors.

नेपालमा निजी शिक्षा ः समस्या र सम्भावना

नेपालमा वैधानिक रूपमा निजी विद्यालय

कालको नेपालमा आजको कपिलवस्तु आसपासको एक सुरुवात भयो । लिच्छुवी र मल्ल कालमा पहेलेखेका सन्तानहरूको लागि शिक्षा दीक्षा दिइन्य्यो । शाह वंशीय कर्मकाण्ड हिन्दु संस्कृति पढाउनको लागि ठाउँ ठाउँमा स्वतः स्फूर्त भाषा पाठशालाहरू खोलिएका थिए तर गुरु सेंगे ठाउँ सर्नेती पाठशालाहरू हालको जस्तो नभएर गुरुकुलीन र आवधिक किसिमका हुन्धे। नेपालमा प्राचीन १९१० मा जङ्ग वहादुरद्वारा दरबार स्कुल खोलिएको राणाबाहेकका बिद्यार्थीहरूलाई पहले अनुमति दिइयो भने ३८ वर्षसम्म विभिन्न दरवार भिन्नैयो सञ्चालित भइरहयो । यो आम जनताको लागि भनेर खोलिएको स्कल थिएन । पछि केही विद्यालयहरू खुले । वि.सं. १९९० सालमा नेपालको एसएलसी बोर्ड स्थापना हुँदा देशमरि जम्मा 1 पाइने नियम आएपछि मात्र विद्यालयहरू खुल्न थाल्नुले यो कराको पुष्टि गर्दछ । पञ्चायती व्यवस्था सुरु भएपछि नयाँ शिक्षा योजना २०२८ ले सार्वजनिक शिक्षाको नाममा पञ्चायती भजन गाउने शिक्षा लाग् गऱ्यो । यसमा वि.सं.२०३२ सालमा ३ कक्षासम्म निःशुल्क शिक्षाको व्यवस्था गरियो । नेपालमा वि.सं. २०२६ सालदेखि औपचारिक रूपमै शिक्षामा निजी क्षेत्रको प्रवेश सुरु भयो । परापूर्वकालमा नेपाल मिथिला (आजको जनकपुर संस्कृति र बौद्ध गरी दुईछुट्टा छुट्टे प्रकारको शिक्षाको लगेर राजधरानका शासन कालको पालामा संस्कृत भाषामा खासगरी मात्र शाह राणाशासन कालको १०१ वर्षपछि २००४ सालमा माउँ आसपास) संस्कृत शिक्षाको ठूलो केन्द्र हो । प्राचीन प्राचीन नेपालको किरौत कालवाट गुरुकुल पद्धतिको अर्थको पहिलो औपचारिक शिक्षालयको रूपमा वि.सं. राज्य एउटा शैक्षिक केन्द्रको रूपमा उदाएको थियो माध्यमिक विद्यालयहरू थिए सबैधानिक कानुनमार्फत नेपालमा विद्यालय थियो । यो विदयालयमा ३२ वर्ष पछि दरबारमे MIS तिन ओटा मात्र व्यवस्था गरियो मानिसहरू

हों । हुन त २०३६ को शिक्षा निजी व्यवस्थापनमा विदयालय ऐन २०६३ बमोजिम विद्यालयहरू विद्यालय सञ्चालन मापदण्ड तथा निर्देशिका जारी भएका हुन् । खासगरी सन् १९९० मा नेपालमा भित्रिएको सञ्चालित विद्यालयले छुट्टे ऐनको माग गई गर्दा थी विदयालयहरूलाई संस्थागत स्वरुप दिन शिक्षा ऐनको त्यसपछि रुपान्तरित १% शिक्षा सेवा शुल्क हुँदै गुज्रेको विदयालयलाई नियमको नाममा २०६९ मा संस्थागत निजी कम्पनी या ग्ठीमार्फत् निजी व्यक्तिहरूको यसरी खोलिएका विद्यालयहरूले आफ्नो सम्पत्ति आफ्ना नेपालमा निजी क्षेत्रले शिक्षामा लगानी गरेको मात्र होइन, यसको गणात्मक र परिमाणात्मक विकास पनि भएको छ। शाही शिक्षा आयोग २०४० तथा राष्ट्रिय शिक्षा आयोग २०४९ ले सरकारी अन्दानबाट सञ्चालित बिद्यालयले मात्र थेग्न नसक्नेदेखि निजी लगानीलाई स्वागत गरेको हो । आम अभिभावकको चाहना र आकर्षणलाई मध्यनजर गर्दै नेपालमा निजी विद्यालयहरू विकास र विस्तार अर्थतन्त्रको प्रभाव र आसमा निजी शिक्षामा थप हो । निजी लगानीमा साती संसोधन २०४७ ले प्रचलित कानन बमोजिम स्थापित कम्पनी तथा शौक्षिक ग्ठीमात्र विद्यालयको मात् संस्था बन्न पाउने व्यवस्था गरेको हो । यसैको जगमा कम्पनीमा दर्ता भए । २०६४ मा आएको ५% शिक्षा कर, समहले आफ्नै आर्थिक लगानीमा विदयालय सञ्चालन उत्तराधिकारीलाई हस्तान्तरण गर्न पाउने व्यवस्थाले गर्न पाउने अधिकार शिक्षा ऐनको ३ मा उल्लेख छ । साथै सञ्चालनको बाटो खोलेको भित्रिएको लीले नै कम्पनी नियमावलीले गरिएको छ,। लगानी to cell 2402

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नेपालमा हाल फण्डे१० हजार संस्थागत विद्यालयतहरू छन्। उच्च शिक्षा र मन्टेश्वरीलाई पृथक राखेर हेर्नेहो भने हाल निजी विद्यालयहरूमा फण्डे९३

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THE VIEW FROM NORTHALLERTON, UK

Northallerton is a prosperous market town (population around 17,000) situated some 250 miles north of London on the main railway line to Scotland. It is surrounded by high quality farming land, and also supports some light industry and tourism. There are two Rotary Clubs in the town: RC of Northallerton, founded by local businessmen in 1947, and their daughter club Northallerton Mowbray founded in the early 1990s.

Both Clubs are part of RI District 1040, which brings together nearly 80 Clubs across Yorkshire. It was this District, led particularly by RC of Harrogate Brigantes (a larger town about 30 miles south of Northallerton), which first linked with RC of The Himalayan Gurkhas in 2011. The project then was to install computers in rural schools, and also ensure that they were going to be properly maintained and used. The first team consisted of 8 Yorkshire Rotarians, at least some of whom (with others) have visited every year since. There is no doubt that without the very active help and support of The Himalayan Gurkhas Club this project would never have worked. They have smoothed our way at every turn, engaging with the schools themselves, local villagers and government authorities whenever necessary. They have also been our most thoughtful hosts, travel agents, and firm friends as well.

The Northallerton Club is responsible for 3 schools assisted by sponsors from RCHGK: Shahid Smarak College (Chitwan) (Rtn Captain As bahadur Gurung), Majhathana HSS (Rtn Maj Bhimbahadur Gurung) and Rithepani LSS (near Pokhara) (Rtn Maj Yambahadur Gurung).

Northallerton Rotarians John Proud and Duncan Davison made several visits during this time, and Major Lil Bahadur Gurung also visited the UK and spoke at our District Conference and at the Northallerton and Harrogate Brigantes Clubs. We were gratified to hear how well the students have been doing, especially when Sirubari was given an extra government computer grant because of their splendid achievement.

Gurkha service in the British Army for 200 years is greatly respected in our country, and they are personally held in high regard. So when news came of the Nepal earthquakes in April 2015 we were pleased we could respond very promptly with financial help, sent directly to the Gurkhas RC. When one Rotary Club has built such strong ties with another the trust becomes absolute: we were totally sure that whatever we gave would be used promptly and effectively, with no question of any "diversions" into Government accounts or other pockets.

But emergency hand-outs were only part of the solution. So our Northallerton Club, again working hand in glove with the Gurkhas RC, has now invested in a Goat Farm at Sirubari. We paid for all the initial buildings and the goats themselves, together with the full first year's Thereafter it is expected to running costs. generate its own profits for the benefit of the village, and also be a source of "goat loans" to other farmers in the Valley (to be paid back in the form of kids). It was formally opened by 3 Northallerton Rotarians in March 2016. We see this as a hand-up rather than a hand-out - and although it will take lots of hard work and careful management to succeed we have every confidence in the end result.

The world-wide Rotary motto is "Service Above Self". The Northallerton Club congratulates the Gurkhas Club on living up to this motto with such energy and dedication, and sends them every good wish for the future.



Motivation to Learning

What is motivation?

Motivation arouses interest. Interest is the mother of attention and attention is the mother of learning. Motivation is an indispensable technique for learning. No learning is possible without motivation.

Psychologists and educators everywhere have very different definitions for the term 'motivation'. Putting it simply, motivation is what lies behind our behaviour: the combination of forces which initiate, direct and sustain behaviour towards a goal. (Lindsley 1957) When applied to the classroom, we can define motivation as what pushes a student to try to learn, or to focus his/her energies in other directions. For teachers the idea of motivation is centred around getting students to apply themselves to the learning at hand. Perhaps even more importantly, motivating students also involves getting them to want to learn. When students have a desire to learn, there is almost no limit to what the teacher and

class can accomplish.


Importance of Motivation in the Classroom

Motivation is an essential factor that must be considered when we attempt to understand how children use their intellectual resources and how we can help to thrive in the classroom. There are two different types of motivation: intrinsic and extrinsic. Intrinsic motivation refers to person's desire to engage in an activity simply because it is pleasing to them and they deserve a certain level of satisfaction or enjoyment from doing it. In the educational setting, intrinsic motivation is evident in children's pleasure for learning in their curiosity, perseverance, and tendency to take up tasks that are both new and challenging. When these and other aspects of intrinsic motivation are not present in the classroom, learning becomes boring and dull and children may fail to grasp certain concepts, because they are no longer interested in the task at hand.

The second type of motivation is extrinsic motivation. Unlike intrinsic motivation, extrinsic motivation prompts people to engage in an activity so that they may gain reward or perhaps avoid an unpleasant situation. Extrinsic motivation







Teaching is like lighting a fire where - the spark between the child and the learning process is to be provided by the teacher. Once the spark is provided the fire will definitely follow. Difficulties will be overcome, boredom will evaporate, ready - to-be-through-with-theproblem attitude will develop. In short, learning process is facilitated.

Factors that Affect Motivation

Motivation in the context of the classroom is a dynamic state that originates from children's perceptions of themselves as well as from their perceptions of the surrounding environment. It is these perceptions that will lead children to select an activity and participate actively in it, hence achieving a specific goal. An important question to ask then, is what factors might play a role in influencing children's perceptions of **Self and Environment**.


One such factor is the teacher's provision for children's <u>basic needs</u>. Children have a very limited attention span and their level of concentration can be seriously affected by their physical state. For example, if a child is hungry, he or she will have difficulty concentrating on the task at hand. Similarly, if the child is tired, he or she will not wish to encourage in classroom activities and will therefore not experience successful learning. Children's motivation to learn and participate will be at optimum levels when basic need have been met.

A second factor that we must consider when discussing motivation is the child's own level of skill and ability. Although children generally progress through the same series of development stages, they do so at their own individual pace. For this reason it is imperative that a teacher provides classroom tasks that are developmentally appropriate. These tasks should be sufficiently challenging to maintain children's interest, but should not be so arduous and difficult that they cause the children to feel frustrated or inadequate. Furthermore, teachers should respect children's individual differences in terms of their intelligence and ability. Praise and encouragement should be offered continuously so that the children feel good about themselves, which will in turn increase their desire to learn. Children who are made to feel as though they have failed in some way will no longer be motivated to engage in certain classroom activities: a factor that is extremely essential to the learning process.



Children's motivation will also be affected by the teacher's attitude and behaviour within the classroom setting. The teacher must therefore strive to provide an atmosphere of warmth and affection for his/her students. Such an atmosphere will win the children's trust and will help them to feel at ease when participating in classroom activities. Teachers who are both kind and nurturing are sure to create a feeling of positive partnership between the children and themselves. This partnership will then serve.

7 Step Strategies for Enhancing Motivation Within the Classroom



1. Awareness of how children learn and child needs

Because motivation is very much influenced by the learning process, as well as the classroom environment, it is important that teachers first have an understanding of how children learn both in and out of the classroom.

First and foremost children learn through their senses. This is why it is so common to find children trying to understand the world around them by experiencing different objects as well as listening to and observing others. Teachers should therefore strive to use this medium when teaching children, so that they will learn both naturally and enthusiastically.

Following are some examples of classroom activities designed to stimulate children's sensory channels, thereby facilitating the learning process.







Children learn through:

- * concrete objects and first hand experience
- play and activities
- * observation of new things in the environment
- repetition of favourite activities
- activities such as music, songs, stories, and rhythms for which children have a natural liking
- participating in small group activities which fulfill their need for individual attention
- * active participation, involvement, and interaction with objects and activities
- * teacher's individual attention and guidance
- participation in active and passive activities as young children have a limited attention span
- experiences and activities appropriate to their level of development and interest

If a teacher keeps in mind the above characteristics, he/she can truly tailor the classroom to fit the need of each individual child. This in turn will improve the overall quality of the learning experience for children at school.

According to Maslow (1954) suggested a hierarchical set of five basic needs, which must be satisfied to reach the highest level of motivation. Similarly these needs have to be understood and fulfilled in order to achieve and attain satisfactory levels of motivation in children. These needs are :



A schematic representation of Maslow's hierarchy of motivation







Physiological Needs

These needs are like hunger, thirst, etc. and serve the function of the maintenance of the organism. A severe deprivation of food, for example, can deprive the child of various opportunities of his intellectual and other developments.

Safety Needs

Children want to have a safe environment. If the safety needs are not satisfied, the child feels a sense of insecurity and develops mistrust.

Love and Belonging Needs

When the child has his sense of security and trust, he/she develops affectionate relationships with other people (parents, peers, and teachers, etc) and has the desire to belong to a wider group. Children need affection from all quarters.

Self-esteem

A child at this level is able to function well in inter personal situations. He develops desire for achievement and competence, for independence and freedom, for reputation and prestige.

Self-actualisation

This is the highest level of motivational goals. It refers to a child's desire for self-fulfilment, to realise his potentialities. This has a special significance at the adolescence stage.

2. Use of an effective teaching approach

When working with children a teacher must adopt an approach that will ensure an interesting, joyful and rewarding learning experience. This teaching approach should revolve around the individual child and his/her development, needs, abilities and interests. The term 'Child Centred Approach' is often used to describe a teaching process that promotes the holistic development of children within the classroom setting. In this process the teacher serves as a guide or facilitator for students. Children and teacher learn hand in hand to achieve their learning objectives.

How can teachers stimulate children to explore new paths to develop their ideas or try something new and challenging? Stimulation in classroom may involve:

- * participating in an activity with a child or group of children
- * offering attractive and varied materials for the children to use and explore
- * offering a variety of classroom activities
- * teaching a new skill or technique
- * designing and arranging a new workshop
- * suggesting field trips

- * leading a discussion by asking open-ended questions to make the children think
- * using humour and laughing together
- * using the children's strengths by showing interest in what they know and what they do or create
- * offering assistance when necessary
- * helping children to formulate their own questions
- # getting children to participate in the organisation of time and space within the classroom and allowing them to assist in setting up classroom rules.
- * allowing repetition of an actively so that children can master it
- alternating between structured and non-structured activities and materials

Similarly, the approach used by teachers at the school level must also serve to encourage and support children in their thinking, feeling and actions. Such support can be lent by a teacher who:

- ✤ encourage spontaneity
- * sits with children individually, listens to them, gives them the time they need, and acknowledges what they are experiencing
- * encourages and accepts children's verbal and non-verbal communication
- * watches the children's progress and

helps them to see it

- * encourages children in their efforts
- * maintains a certain regular schedule, especially at the beginning of the school year
- * reviews the classroom rules and displays them for the children to see, also making sure that they understand what the rules mean
- * supplies appropriate materials and makes them available to the children so that they can use them independently and then put them away without help
- * takes pleasure in doing things with the children and express enthusiasm
- allows the children to make choices and experience an activity in their own way
- offers help until the child indicates readiness to process alone
- * fosters an atmosphere of exploration and experimentation by not critising mistakes

Finally, school teachers should strive to challenge their students by criticising, judging, imposing rules, or adopting positions which put the children in situations they may not like, but nevertheless have to face. By confronting children in this manner a teacher has the ability to modify certain situations, attitudes and behaviours. The teacher can







create this kind of challenge by:

- encouraging respect for the rules of the classroom and of society
- * asking children who are in a conflict situation to explain themselves and to talk about the problem

expressing disagreement

* making children understand that they are responsible for their actions

If these challenges are to serve a positive purpose, they must always be presented in an atmosphere of caring. A teacher whose mood inhibits his/her ability to be caring or affectionate is better to avoid creating such challenging situations.

3. Planning and preparing for classroom activities

Providing clear and concise instructions in the classroom is another important way of enhancing the teaching/learning experience. Good planning and preparation by teachers before entering the classroom will increase children's motivation and commitment towards learning. Teachers should aim to make lesson plans that incorporate learning focuses, choose situations that will be meaningful for the children, and make the children aware of their own needs, learning abilities. Planning in terms of daily activities and yearly curriculum is essential for smooth functioning in the classroom. The following are some important guidelines for the planning of daily activities:

- * Maintain a good balance of individual and group activities
- Include both indoor and outdoor activities
- * Plan active and passive activities alternatively
- * Plan activities that proceed from simple to complex
- * Plan activities that proceed from familiar to unfamiliar
- * Plan activities that unsure overall development of children

4. Organisation of space

The organisation of space in the classroom is another important consideration for teachers who wish to promote a joyful learning experiences. Children do not need to be in ideal physical surroundings to develop. However, when a large group of children are brought together in one place with the aim of stimulating their development, it is critical that the arrangement of space and materials within that environment is consistent with the objectives that the teacher hopes to attain.

The organisation of the classroom reflects the teacher's educational values, as well as his/her views of the child and the







teaching/learning process. Children learn by trial and error, so if the space around them is not designed to accommodate this need, they will constantly be getting into things or in each other's way. Therefore, the arrangement of the learning environment both inside and outside of the building should not be done haphazardly, but rather with careful thought and consideration.

5. Physical organisation of classroom materials

The placement, selection and variety of materials available in the classroom can also serve to influence children's motivation for learning. Materials should be varied, stimulating, versatile, safe, durable, and attractive to children. Materials should encourage activities of discovery, invention, and exploration. Such materials may include

- * Materials for examining life
- * Materials for playing "grown-up
- * Materials for creative expression
- * Materials for different themes

One important thing to keep in mind is that educational materials are often very costly and may be limited to specific purpose. As an alternative, teachers may wish to cooperate with parents in collecting a variety of materials not usually available in specilasied stores. These materials are useful in helping children acquire the habit of making do with objects that are commonly found within the home and they also lend more scope to children's creativity.

Classroom materials should be arranged in such a way as to highlight their attractiveness. This will serve to draw children's attention to the materials and revive their interest in the learning process. Materials should not be left sitting in one place for too long, because the children will no longer notice them and will not be motivated to utilise them.

6. Organisation of time

Most children find very difficult to schedule their time. Therefore, teachers must strive to schedule activities that proceed in regular segments, so as to facilitate children's understanding of time and also to motivate them to want to take part in the daily classroom activities. The activities should follow a routine that is designed to meet the developmental needs of children. For example, children arrive, play, have a toilet break, have snack time, a cleanup period, library time, laboratory time, computer time etc. for sharing and discussion, more free play, and finally a main activity that may involve a







workshop project or something similar. Listed below are some important points to keep in mind when establishing a daily routine in school.

- Alternative calm activities with more active ones
- * Plan activities to be done individually or in large or small groups
- * Choose activities that have specific objectives as well as ones that have more general objectives
- * Make sure that the activities are adapted to the children's pace

7. Selection of activities


Since the school education program is focused on the holistic development of the child, activities in the classroom generally do not consist of systematic exercises. Instead the teacher should choose activities that allow children to function in a way that is natural and enjoyable for them. In order to motivate children to take part in classroom activities the teacher must also ensure that the selected activities are appropriate to the different dimensions of child development and should take into account how this development occurs. The following are some criteria which should be considered when selecting activities. Teachers should choose activities :

* that meet the demands of the

pleasure principle in children

- * the proceed from the children's focuses of interest, sparking their curiosity and imagination
- * that lead children to make choices and to realise and evaluate the consequences of those choices
- * that lead to the gradual but real empowerment of children in the areas of planning organisation, execution and evaluation
- * that are based on real, concrete experience (i.e. physical handling of materials solving real problems) that are based on real, concrete experience (i.e. physical handling of materials solving real problems)
- * that allow all the children to succeed recognising that each child has a different capacity for success
- * that lead children to solve current problems or improve situations in their personal lives
- * that allow children to actually participate in the management of the classroom by involving them in the development, application, evaluation and modification of instructions or classroom rules.
 Classroom Motivation

Students in the classroom learning need constant motivation from the teachers so that optimum use of their talents may be made for their development. The needs are the basis of motivation.




Meyer and Middleton (1993) explain, "Make sure that the motivating aspects of any educational activity are focused on the learning afforded by the activity. If the motivation is focused on aspects peripheral to learning, like on obtaining treats or getting out of class, then anything that is learned will also be peripheral to the content objectives" (p.290).

Teachers are trying their level best to push and pull the education system (cart). But its very depressing to observe that it can't be pulled smoothly because of the adverse existing system which work as the wheels of the education system. Now we have to accept the challenges and try to face and solve them. Let us remove the flat wheels and fix the proper wheels (round ones) to apply right based, child friendly, joyful teaching learning approaches, which is fully known as motivated learning.

Conclusion

Responsible, highly motivated students provide a great source of satisfaction for us all. They learn more, learn faster, and create fewer discipline problems than do poorly motivated students. Highly motivated students allow us to spend more time teaching, less time on classroom management problems. Their enthusiastic approach to learning makes our job enjoyable.

On the other hand, when we encounter reluctant learners, we sometimes fell helpless and frustrated. We know they could do better if only they would try. But how can we get them to try?

The question most often asked is just this: **How can I get them to try?** I try reasoning with them. I try threatening them, I even offer them special rewards. Nothing seems to interest them. What can I do?

Developing student motivation towards school work is one of the most important skill you acquire, yet it is surely the most difficult 'job'. Motivation is an emotional force or attitude that makes

someone want to do something; it cannot be pumped in from the outside. That is why persuasion and force don't work. Persuasion speaks form outside through logic and reasoning, leaving the emotions largely untouched. Force leads to resentment - a negative attitude towards the teacher and the task rather than a positive one. Neither persuasion nor force will change a student's attitude in the long run. Extrinsic incentives, too, are unsatisfactory as motivators. While incentives can sometimes lead students to do what you want them to do in specific cases, these incentives do not create a more positive attitude towards school work and learning in general. The use of incentives leads primarily to the need to provide more and more incentives.

Persuasion, force, and incentives are outside forces, but motivation comes from within. Inside each one of us is a powerful determiner of attitudes and behaviour - our self image, as we imagine ourselves to be, so we become. The beliefs we have of what we are like and what we are not like shape our attitudes and our responses to the outside world. Lasting change in a student's motivation towards school work comes only through a change in his/her self image as a learner. The most powerful way for us to help a student become an eager, highly motivated learner is to help him/her to think, feel, and believe in him/herself as a competent, successful learner.

Self images are fairly stable; they do not change easily or quickly. But they shape their self images from the reflection they see in significant others. As powerful







and significant persons in our students' school world, we play a central role in shaping their beliefs about themselves as learners. Our actions and reactions towards students show them what they are. The way we phrase the questions we ask, the comments we make regarding their work, the length of time we pause after asking a questions – all these help to shape their self-images.

Here are ten steps we can take to help make a student believe in him/herself as a learner:

- 1. Make the student feel included.
- Spend time talking and listening to the student.
- Help the student develop positive self-expectations.
- Capitalize on what the student knows.
- 5. Set the stage for success.

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- Use brainstorming to develop topics and ideas.
- 7. Demonstrate enthusiasm for the

topic under study.


- Use encouraging, positive responses to the student's work and show enthusiasm for his contributions.
- Elicit feedback about the class from the students.
- 10. Always end on a positive note.

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

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
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25 Reasons to go Hiking around Nepal & the Himalayas


6. World Heritage Sites

We can understand their hospitality by a common phrase which the Nepalese use while greeting visitors "Guests are God".



So this is always a sensational experience. Especially in Nepal enjoy Hiking and enjoy all flavors.


20. Hoteling

Tanya Hall, 38 Melbourne, Australia

Charity: Hearts4heart

Medical Condition: Cardiac arrhythmias, including atrial fibrillation Medical Therapy: Pacemaker

Tanya was born with a hole in her heart and a heart murmur. She had open heart surgery when she was nine years old. At 21, she awoke to severe chest pain, her heart racing at two hundred beats per minute. Ultimately, she was diagnosed with a number of heart arrhythmias, and received a pacemaker. In 2011, frustrated with the lack of cardiac patient support groups in Australia, and at a loss for how she would spend the rest of her life, Tanya founded hearts4heart to fill both voids.

Tanya's Story

"I was born with a hole in my heart and a heart murmur. I had quarterly visits to the cardiologist up until the age of nine, when I had open heart surgery. At 21, I had my first 'episode.' I awoke feeling as though I was having a heart attack. I was vomiting. My heart was racing at two hundred beats per minute. I was experiencing chest pain and felt as if I was going to faint. Somehow I made it to my doctor for emergency surgery. This was followed by 12 more years of heart-related incidents, with my heart getting progressively worse.

"I have a complicated heart that consists of a number of arrhythmia conditions that include atrial fibrillation, atrial flutter, tachycardia (fast heartbeat) and bradycardia (slow heartbeat). Eventually, I received a pacemaker that helps me manage my condition.

"After surgery, I was feeling at a loss as to where my life was headed and I had no idea what my future held. I didn't know how much longer I would even be here. I had very big decisions to make about my heart health and looked for information and support.

"I soon realized there wasn't anything available in Australia. I had searched for a support group or forum, but I couldn't find anyone to talk to who was in the same situation as me. The more research I did, the more I was amazed that although heart disease is the biggest killer and is the biggest cost to our health system, there was still no support and little information available.

"I didn't want to sit around and feel helpless. So I decided to do something about it. In 2011, I took leave from work, and using my own money I founded hearts4heart...a website for likeminded people with cardiac health issues to contact one another, offer support and share information. My pacemaker gives me security. I am able to resume my physical activities and live normally with confidence."

"Never give up on your dreams, no matter your circumstance."



Club to send goats to earthquake-hit Nepal

NORTHALLERTON

Rotary Club is investing in a 32-strong goat herd in a remote Nepalese valley, working directly with the Rotary Club of the Himalayan Gurkhas in Kathmandu. The project will help the inhabitants get back on their feet after las year's devastating earthquakes. For over five years, members of the Northallerton Club have travelelled annually to Nepal to install computers in village schools in the remote Panchamul Valley, west of Pokhara in Nepal . They have also provided IT training to the teachers and pupils, and have established friendships in the process.

The project has now grown to cover 22 school and has transformed life prospects for the pupils, and also their villages. Following the earthquakes in April and May 2015 the club was able to give immediate funds, using the ROTARY international network, for the local procurement and distribution of blankets and rice.

The club has now initiated a project to provide goats and equipment to the same community in the Panchamul Valley at a cost for the first year of £ 4115. Goats are the preferred source of milk and meat in the local area and the herd will grow quickly to benefit progress serving more families. The herd should also be self sustaining financially after the first year .





Major Lil of RC Himalayan Gurkhas was our guest speaker at the Saturday morning Plenary Session at Conference

Lil spoke of the Aid work identified and carried out by members of the RC Himalayan Gurkhas following the earthquakes in April made possible by the District Nepal Appeal.

District 1040 Clubs such as Harrogate Brigands, Settle, Skipton, IlkleyWharfdale and many others have engaged with the Rotary Clubs in Nepal for many years on Projects to improve life for the people of Nepal.

During a very emotional presentation Major Lil thanked Rotary in Yorkshire for its support and looked forward to working with us on future projects of which there are many.

The District Nepal Appeal will close at the end of November 2015 however and looking towards future projects in Nepal Harrogate Brigandesheld a Dinner Dance at the Crown Hotel and raised over £9,000 thanks in part to the efforts of the Crown Hotel to secure substantial donations from it's suppliers. A portion of the money raised will go towards resuming water supplies to the villages affected by the earthquake.



Short Interaction with Bhuvan Dahal

 Can you provide us a brief introduction of yourself in your own words? Also comment on your early years at Sanima Bank.

Ans. I have been in the banking industry for almost 25 years. I spent almost 22 years in Nabil Bank, the first foreign joint venture bank of the country. For last three years, I have been with Sanima Bank, the youngest commercial bank. Prior to joining banking industry, I worked at Parliament Secretariat for 2 years. Before that, I was a school teacher. I have been enjoying wherever I am working.

2. How has banking sector in general contributed to the growth and development of national economy?

Ans. Banking sectors and Economy have flesh and blood relationship. Banks provide an intermediation service that brings savers and investors together. It channels public fund and invests in productive sector which results in accelerated economic activities, trade, employment generation etc. Today, we see material positive changes in many sectors of the economy such as education, health, aviation, transportation, communication, information technology etc. Banking sector's contribution is significant in these achievements.

3. Where do banks stand in the 21st century? What are the prospects of their development in the years ahead ?

Ans. In general, people understand banks as a corporate body that collects the deposit of public and provide loan with certain interest but today's banks are like financial department stores where all financial services are available. Banks have moved towards universal banking along with the increased usage of technology and technology-based services offering alternate channels such as cards, ATMs, internet and mobile banking. Technological advancement has redefined the banking. It will continue to remain at the centre stage of the economy of a country.

4. Tell us something about Sanima Bank's past and present in brief. Where do you see it 10 years below the line?

Ans. Since its inception, Sanima has remained a trusted bank. Sanima has always focused on good corporate governance. Bank continues to maintain the lowest NPL level in the industry. Besides credit risk, other risks are also being efficiently managed. Our team from Jhapa to Kanchanpur is working hard continuously to strengthen our foothold. We have been introducing new products in the market. Our staff are endowed with required skills. We are recognized as one of the top 5 banks as per CAMEL's rating. Our reputation in the market is growing materially. Recently we have registered our subsidiary company named Sanima Capital and it will be in operation very soon. There is still a long way to go to compete with international banks but I am confident the professional Sanima Team will take Sanima there in 10 years.

5. What role has Sanima Bank played in Nepalese economy in particular? Can you illustrate your point with specific examples?

Ans. Sanima has helped build many small, mid-size and large scale industries, financed hospitals and long term infrastructure projects including Hydropowers, all with the belief that growth in these sectors leads to overall growth of

the nation. Our loan volume is currently around Rs.37 billions. Sanima has provided employment to around 700 people directly. This year, we will pay close to Rs.500 million tax to the government.

6. What particular difference have you made ever since you joined Sanima Bank?

Ans. In last three years, our team has worked very hard for making Sanima one of the leading banks in the country from almost a nascent stage. I feel proud to be part of the team achieving these successes.

7. In what key areas do you think are your costumers satisfied with Sanima Bank?

Ans. We are known as one of the innovative banks focused on customer service. We make decisions keeping customers at centre stage. We would like to constantly improve in this front for customer delight.

8. Where does Sanima Bank stand in terms of development of infrastructures, Such as education, agriculture, hydroelectricity and health?

Ans. As mentioned above, Sanima bank has been actively financing in all these sectors. Since there is no system of publishing comparative position of banks in these areas, I am not aware where we stand vis-à-vis other banks.

9. How has Sanima Bank been handling corporate social responsibility? Does it come to your priority? Do you have particular examples to mention?

Ans. We have been active in CSR from the beginning. We had tied up with Tilganga for support to eye patients. Our outside Kathmandu valley branches have been providing every year stipend to 4 poor students of the locality for higher education. We have recently joined hands with Nepal Press Council for providing an annual prize of Rs.500,000.00 to a journalist or institution contributing significantly to the journalism sector.

10. Final words on Nepalese banking?

Ans. Banking sector of Nepal is one of the most transparent and advanced sectors of the country. We feel it is almost at par with international banks in many areas. It is constantly keeping itself abreast of latest developments in the banking sector.









